Study abroad

The Study Abroad Program gives BCC students the opportunity to learn more and experience different cultures, customs, languages, history and much more.

This year the International Education Department has added two new countries to their extensive list of international programs and, like every year, they are awarding the William E. Greene Scholarship (WEGS) for students who wish to attend a full semester in one of their four international affiliates.

This program offers full length semesters in over a dozen foreign countries including India, Singapore, Spain, Ecuador, Italy and Australia to name a few. Other summer Study Abroad Programs are being offer in 2008 to Spain, India, Cambridge University in England, Mexico, Germany and two new additions this year: Egypt and Israel.

The Egypt summer program is a combination of classroom lectures on Central Campus from June 9 to June 11 and travel experience in Egypt from June 25 to July 7. Students participating will earn three credits in Social Science, which are transferable to any four-year institution.

Donald Cleveland, Dean of Student Development Department on Central Campus, said "Traveling abroad to Egypt will allow students to see first hand the area where civilization began, visit ancient places and the land of the pharaohs."

During this trip students will visit the Necropolis at Sakkara, the temples of Ramses II and Queen Nefertari, the Luxor, the pyramids and it also includes a five day, four night cruise on the Nile River.

The estimated cost is \$3,799 per person. This includes roundtrip airfare, hotel, transportation, meals, and entrance to parks,

Security Officer breaks into professor's office

In light of what is happening in our world today, it would be appropriate for BCC to be extra cautious when hiring staff, especially in the security department. Students and staff depend upon the college to insure their safety by employing individuals qualified to "serve and protect" using guidelines similar to any law enforcement

agency. Granted, the background checks for private security firms are not as stringent as for a police department but that does not

make them any less important.

A break-in occurred on North Campus near the end of October and the perpetrator was caught on Khan said he went to his tape. Here is how the whole thing played out.

A. Fuad Khan, 48, is a professor of microbiology on North Campus. He was voted Professor of the Year 2007-2008 on North. Khan has been teaching at BCC for 19 years and is an Endowed Teaching Chair Award Recipient.

Khan became suspicious that someone may have been entering his office after hours. According to Khan, he had a student in his class

supervisor, Dr. Eileen Garcia and expressed his concern. "I asked for permission to set up a surveillance camera in my office," he said. According to Khan, Garcia suggested that he make up a "dummy exam" and leave it and the answer sheet on his desk as bait. Khan said he took her advice. He then proceeded to set up a surveillance camera in his office. The scene was now set... right out of "To Catch a Thief".

Khan's hunch proved to be correct. The very next morning when he returned to his office he sensed someone uninvited had been rifling through the papers on his desk. "I wasn't sure until I saw the video," he said. He was positive he locked the door

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Three huge events at Central library

The grand opening of the Will & Jo Holcombe Institute for Teaching and Higher Learning was a landmark event which brought together numerous dignitaries including Senator Jim Scott and Alan & Susie Levan from BankAtlantic and the BankAtlantic Foundation, Inc.

The Jan. 29 grand opening ceremony was the lead-off of a chain of events that took place on the fourth floor of the library on Central Campus. One of the highlights of the celebration was the presentation of an award to the Levans for their continued support of the BCC Foundation and the work that it does in the community.

The purpose of the program was to honor Jo & Will Holcombe for their untiring efforts in furthering the support that BCC offers to its students. According to BCC President, J. David Armstrong Jr., the Holcombes' vision for the Institute is to recruit and retain world-class educators and to disseminate effective, up-to-date teaching skills through a comprehensive faculty development program.

Lloyd Rhodes, Chairman of the BCC Foundation, said that five years ago the funding for the Holcombe Institute was spearheaded by the BCC Foundation. His comments were met with a laugh when he recalled one fund-raising event at which Susie Levan arranged for a high school marching band to provide entertainment. "To this day I don't know how she ever arranged that," he exclaimed. "That was incredible."

Dr. Joyanne Stevens, FAU Vice President, was there representing FAU President Frank Brogan. Stevens said she didn't think BCC could have chosen a more fitting tribute to honor Dr. and Mrs. Holcombe. "Early on, under the leadership of Will Holcombe, in our partnership with BCC, we began to focus on developing programs that encouraged students to enter the field of education. We called it a challenge, but Will called it an opportunity, so today we are expanding on that opportunity with the opening of this fabulous institute," she said.

When Holcombe introduced by Stevens he received a standing ovation from the members of the audience. In his remarks Holcombe acknowledged numerous people who over the years have been involved in the evolution of BCC to where it is

"Back when all this began we had meetings where we tried to figure out how we could create, in Broward County, a betterconnected teaching force," he said. "Not just for people coming into the (teaching) profession but for people who are already in the profession."

Holcombe said that the new Teaching Institute will also be the spring-board for the new

baccalaureate program being offered at BCC. Julia Vattiato, Director of the Educator Preparation Institute (EPI) said her section of the Holcombe Institute will be targeting people currently holding degrees in other areas convincing them to switch their career to teaching.

Following the grand opening ceremony, guests were invited to an informal tour of the fourth-floor facility which now houses the BCC Collection which is being cataloged and assembled by BCC archival librarian, Andrew Dutka. buffet lunch provided at noon and the Central Campus Student Forum began immediately following the break.

David Asencio, Dean of Student Affairs said his office had

Following the Student Forum, the BCC Board of Trustees conducted its regular monthly meeting where Trustee Levi Williams received a plaque for his service to the Board and his participation as Chairman of the Florida Council on the Status of Black Men & Boys.

One of the action items to be decided upon by the Board was the renewal of President Armstrong's contract. Although Armstrong's contact is for twoand-a-half years, it is reviewed annually at the first meeting of the calendar year. The Trustees not only unanimously approved the renewal but they rolled it up to a full three-year term, thereby indicating their satisfaction with his performance to date.

The terms of the contract also include a guaranteed bonus. Before the Board could vote to approve that expenditure, Armstrong interjected his desire to not to receive the automatic five percent increase to which he is entitled. "With the budget constraints the college is facing this year, I feel compelled to ask you not to grant me the increase," he said. Because of this magnanimous gesture, Board attorney, Kevin Fernander advised the Board that they would have to pass a motion to revise Armstrong's contract for 2008 and then vote to approve an amended renewal. The stunned Board members happily voted to approve the contract and then continued on with the business of

Women in Distress of Broward County are a state-certified full service domestic violence program designed to help women who need help. This organization has been involved with this


for many years and has had tremendous success in assisting female victims of domestic violence. Their services include counseling, shelter, classes and support services.

Another point St. Claire made is that instead of being rightbrained or left-brained, people are whole brained and have multiple intelligences. Therefore, in order to achieve one's full potential, he or she must use all of their abili-

"The difference between regu-

St. Claire engaged the audience in several physical activities in order to re-enforce her idea that people must learn by doing. One of the activities required that the audience recite the alphabet while lifting either their right arm, left arm or both arms. According to St. Claire, the activity helps people use more than one part of their brain

SGA appoints new president and vice president

There has been an unanticipated replacement of the President and Vice President of Student Government (SGA) on South Campus.

For the past two years, change has permeated within and throughout the halls of BCC, but this semester there has been resolution.

Bethzabeth Ordaz and Francesca Gonzalez have been appointed as President and Vice President until upcoming elections of March 2007, taking the places of Orlando Fraticelli and Kevin Blackmon.

Fraticelli was part of SGA since January 2005 as Vice President before being elected President in March 2006. He then decided to step down in December 2007 to continue his education, majoring in Psychology. He left his mark and now, as he says, "it's their time to shine."

Their main goal was, as Fraticelli said, "to teach them[SGA and the student body] how it is in the real world."

Before being appointed Vice President, Blackmon started off as a member in the Fall of 2006, becoming Senator of Governmental Relations in 2007, which is the same position he holds now.

To start off with three members and finish with 57 is quite an accomplishment. But they were also involved with the beautification of the campus, putting lights in the parking

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Security officer caught on hidden camera

before he left the previous evening and it was securely locked when he arrived for work. Khan played back the video and sure enough, the thief was caught on tape, stealing the test paper and answer sheet.

Much to his surprise, the thief was wearing a uniform. He immediately recognized the uniform as that of a BCC Security Guard. He said he was shocked mediately recognized the uniform as that of a BCC Security Guard. He said he was shocked and could not believe what he was seeing "I e-mailed Eileen Garcia and asked her what I should do next," he said. In a return email, a copy of which has been obtained by the Observer, Garcia wrote, "Give it to me. I will take care of it ASAP!" According to Khan, it turned out that the guard, Davidson Jean-Baptiste, is married to the student whose grades improved so dramatically in such a short period of time.

Khan went on to say the next day Garcia asked him again to give a copy of the tape to her. "At that time I wasn't sure if this was a valid activity or not so I refused," he said. "I called my union (UFF) president and asked her if I had done anything wrong. Debbie Nycz spoke with the union lawyers and they confirmed that it was all legal," he said. "There was nothing wrong with my behavior. In fact, Provost Barbara Bryan called me that afternoon and confirmed that I did not do anything wrong, but I sensed from her tone of voice that she was not happy with the circumstances."

Khan said that in the days that followed he began to feel as though he was being persecuted for uncovering the crime. "Garcia called me and said that Dr. George Stalliard (Dean of Business Affairs) wanted to view the tape, if possible. So, Dr. Stalliard and I met in Garcia's office and we all viewed the tape," he said. "I caught (on tape) the thief in the act but they were making me feel like the criminal," he lamented.

Apparently there was no concrete policy in place regarding video surveillance so, within three days of the incident a Suspicious Activities Protocol was issued from Stalliard's office. Khan said that after playing the video he had hoped that the guard would immediately have the master keys taken away at the very least, be placed on administrative leave until it could all be sorted out. "It is my understanding that the guard still had the keys for a few days afterward," he said.

Khan felt that the administration was remiss in that it did not pursue a criminal action against the guard. "Property was stolen and the thief should be prosecuted," he exclaimed. Khan said he continued to follow the chain of events that ensued, trying to get answers. "A police report was filed but nothing came of it," he said. This information added to Khan's frustration thus aggravating him even more.

On Nov. 29 Lt. Douglas Barclay e-mailed Khan informing him that North Campus Provost Barbara Bryan advised his office that the incident is a college matter and no further police involvement was required. This infuriated Khan whereupon he insisted to Barclay that he was the victim, not the college, and he wished to prosecute. Barclay told him that based on his experience a case like this would never be accepted for prosecution. According to Barclay, the standard used by the state attorney deciding to accept a case is, "likelihood of convic-

According to Khan, the guard was eventually terminated but it took more than a month for it to happen. Khan said that Denese Edsall, AVP, Employee Relations, informed him on Dec.12 that the guard had indeed been fired. In a telephone interview with the Observer, Dr. Bryan said that the guard in fact had resigned. "There

are a lot of incorrect statements being made about this whole thing." she said. "I wish we could speak out about this, but all parties have their rights and we cannot violate those rights." Khan then turned his anguish toward the student.

"I wanted to see some action taken based on the code of conduct. That student was just as guilty as

the security guard," he said. Khan's zeal has gotten him into trouble. It is a matter of record that he interfered with the investigation by directly confronting the student making accusations, raising his voice and threatening expulsion from the college. The student then filed a campus safety incident report and was subsequently transferred out of his class.

In January he received a written reprimand from Dr. Monica

Ramirez, Academic Dean, North Campus, for insubordination and unprofessional activity contending that when the student was re-assigned from his class his involvement ended. "Instead of taking any action against the student, this is what I get in response," he said. "This is a nightmare. I PHOTO BY BUZZ LAMB thought I was doing something

right for the college and it has tuned into something really, really ugly," he said.

A call to Dr. Stalliard emanated the comment that the college has issued a statement through the Public Relations Department and as far as they are concerned no further discussion will be had regarding this matter. "The instruction we have received is that is the final word," he said.

While attending the grand opening of the Holcombe Institute on Central Campus, BCC President J. David Armstrong was interviewed by WPLG Channel 10 news at which time he told the reporter he did not wish to say anything until the college had all of the information associated with the incident.

A phone call by the Observer to BCC Special Assistant to the President for Public Relations, Jillian Printz, produced similar results. Printz said that she could not comment on the matter because there is still an on-going investigation concerning the situation. According to Printz, the BCC legal department, Human Resources Department and the Student Affairs department are involved. "As soon as it is completed, our information about the incident will be public. That is protected by statute," she said.



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REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES IN DEBATE MEDIATED BY BRIAN WILLIAMS

Hundreds of media personnel from all over the nation turned out for the Republican debate at Florida Atlantic University on Jan. 24. The debate was a tremendous event for the university and for students and faculty members. Presidential candidates were able to present their issues and answer questions and concerns facing the United States and beyond.

The most popular issue was, without a doubt, the economy. Specific economic included, but were not limited to, high property taxes and sky-rocketing gas prices. Each nominee answered individually how they could ease the struggles that millions of Americans are suffering from. It was evident that each candidate agreed on one thing, to cut-taxes.

Tim Russert and Brian Williams from NBC would be the mediators for the televised event. Russert presented each question and made sure that the question was answered.

The bold defiance struck a round of applause throughout the auditorium. This would not be the last of Paul's stern detachment from his own party throughout the night.

As a whole, the presidential candidates agreed on how they would reform taxes and came to an unusual conformity. There was a conscious effort in which every candidate complimented each other. This wouldn't have anything to do with the highly publicized in-fighting between Clinton and Obama. In fact, the only dirt-kicking you would hear that night was Mitt Romney referring to nemesis Hillary

Clinton.

Clinton was a very popular punching bag for Romney. "She is Washington to the core," he said. "... The last thing America needs is sending the Clintons back to Washington."

The feeling of the debate was one of excitement and revelry for republican supporters. The rumor of democratic candidates not participating in their own debate in Florida, to the students, was an advantage for republicans. "I didn't know who I wanted to support; you know I was on the fence. But I think when they come out hear and speak to us you get a better idea and almost get to know them better." said Rachel Collins, a graduate student at FAU.

The actual presence of the candidates was crucial according to most students on campus. When it came to the outcome of the debate, it was unclear who actually came out on top.

Holcombe named chancellor of Florida's community colleges

Former BCC Willis Holcombe has been named Chancellor of Florida's Community College system. Holcombe became interim chancellor in October 2007 and was appointed as Chancellor on Jan. 24 by Education Commissioner, Eric J. Smith.

Ironically Dr. Holcombe, in effect, has traded places with current BCC President J. David

Armstrong. Jr. who resigned the chancellor's position last July to take over as BCC President. Holcombe initially began his career at BCC as an English professor and in WILLIS HOLCOMBE. 1987 he became

President, a position he held until 2004 when he "retired".

Upon the 2006 resignation of Dr. Larry Calderon, his replacement, Holcombe came out of retirement to once again take over the reins of running the college as interim president. Holcombe was instrumental in implementing an exhaustive nation-wide search which concluded with the selection of Armstrong by the BCC Board of

"Once David was situated, I went back into retirement. I took the summer off but President in October the then-interim education commissioner called me and asked if I would fill in as interim chancellor until they found a replacement for David," Holcombe explained.

> Holcombe said Smith was appointed Commissioner of Education soon after he accepted the interim chancellor position, "around Christmastime he came to me and said he wanted me

to stay on as chancellor." Holcombe said he thought it over for a while and then agreed to stay on as chancellor through the next legislative

session. "We'll see what happens after that," he said.

Holcombe went on to say that even though he is leaning toward retiring again, what he really wants to do is teach. He said that the chancellor's position will give him an "in" the university system in Florida. "As a matter of fact, I am teaching a class in Tallahassee this semester," he said with a grin. "My passion is teaching."

Holcombe said that the job as chancellor is not the same as being a college president. "It's definitely not a nine-to-five job, but neither is being a college president. David is certainly finding that out," he chuckled. Holcombe said he is thankful that he can be available to teach in addition to handling the rigors of his newly appointed position. "The chancellor's job is very intense when the legislature is in session but when they are not there it drops off," he said.

Now that he has seen both sides of the coin, Holcombe said being on the local level as a college president is more taxing and time consuming. "I have now done both jobs, and David has as well. He is certainly getting an education here at BCC. Now he knows what it is like to be on the front line and I think he is doing a fabulous job," he said.

With more than 30 years of experience in educational leadership and administrative experience, the former Marine Corps Captain will most likely leave his trademark stamp of excellence on the state system just as he has done here at BCC.

Commissioner Smith recently said of Holcombe, "Florida is fortunate to have such a wellrespected and seasoned leader at the helm of our nationallyrecognized community college system."

museum and other places. meals, and entrance to parks, museum and other places. The price does not include course tuition, and passport/visa fees.

According to Cleveland, 12 people have signed up for the program and they still have eight spots available for students who wish to participate.

The Land of Israel is another addition for this year. The University of Haifa will conduct this program and it has a minimum of 25 participants. Students will earn three credits in Humanities and have the opportunity from June 15 to July 3 to have on-site lectures at the most important historical sites in Israel in combination with classroom seminars at the University.

Students will learn from this experience the connection between Judaism, Christianity and Islam. They will visit David's city, Mt. Zion, Mt. Olives, the Dead Sea, Nazareth, Sea of Galilee, Ghetto Fighters' Museum and many more.

As part of the effort to give students life changing experiences, the William E. Greene Scholarship (WEGS) will be awarded to students interested in attending a full semester at one of the following four international sites: International Center for Management and India Studies in Bangalore -India, Center for

American Education in Singapore, International College of Seville in Seville- Spain and Brookdale College of Ecuador in Guayaquil-Ecuador. The application deadline for the fall term of 2008 is March 15 and for spring 2009 is Oct. 1.

"WEGS is the most generous scholarship that BCC offers because it includes the cost of tuition, housing, airfare and visas," said David Moore, Associate Vice-President for International Education.

According to Moore, depending on the money available, three to four scholarships will be awarded. "The committee will pick, in April, the best students that will benefit from this experience," said Moore.

Students seeking to apply for WEGS must be 18 years or older at the time of departure, be a BCC degree-seeking student, include, with the application, two letters of recommendation from faculty and have earned a minimum GPA of 3.0

Students have to indicate on the application their preference for one of the locations by identifying their first, second and third choices. The committee will try to place the student in one of their first two choices.

Moore said, "The scholarship is a tremendous opportunity for students that do not have the means to have a life changing experience."

Focus on the environment

Focus the Nation consists of coordinating teams of faculty and students in the United States to collaboratively engage in interdisciplinary discussions about Global Warning Solutions. On Jan. 21 this program was held at BCC Central Campus, on the patio of Building 19, to give information to students and faculty about the planet.

"Global Warming poses a serious threat to people and natural systems across the planet," said a representative of Focus the Nation. "Public and private policy decisions about global warning this decade will have impacts lasting for generations."

Diana Honeyblue, a Student Life representative, was the person that brought Focus the Nation to Central Campus. "This is the first year that we doing this; it is very exiting," she said. They showed a movie called an Inconvenient Truth that explains the process of global warming.

After the movie, Vanessa Gallego, a BCC student, said that she was amazed and that she could not believe what was going on with the planet. "From now on I will do anything to help control the global warming." Another student, Juan Ortega, said, "I think global warming is happening, but people exaggerate about it; it is just a life cycle."

One of the stations at the event was Energy Star, which discussed how to convert mechanical energy into electrical energy. According to Energy Star, if the energy efficiency of commercial and industrial buildings is improved by 10 percent, Americans would save about \$20 billion and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Another station focused on recycling. There are ways in which people can recycle to help the earth. Recycling just one aluminum can provides enough electricity to power a TV for three hours, according to Broward County Waste and Recycling Services.

To recycle effectively people only need to use two bins. In one bin they should include aluminum and steel cans, milk/juice cartons and drink boxes and green and clear glass containers. In the other bin they should include newspapers and inserts, such as: magazines, catalogs, computer paper, envelopes, junk mail and cereal boxes.

Recycling trucks will take those bins to the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF), which does the rest of the sorting. After it is all recycled MRF will ship materials to manufacturing plants that create recycled-content products.

According to Broward County Wastes and Recycling Services, "Every ton of paper that is recycled saves 17 trees and keeps 60 pounds of air pollution out of the atmosphere. The energy saved by recycling one glass bottle is enough to light a light bulb for four hours."

In order to help the environment there are several steps that people should follow before planting on their properties: plan and design, make a sketch of the landscape site, obtain a soil analysis, determine the soil composition from sandy to clay, test for the pH composition of the soil, choose proper plants; match each spot in your landscape with plants that thrive in the specific conditions of the spot, use turf wisely, consider more water-thrifty alternatives such as groundcovers or mulched walkways, irrigate efficiently, use mulch and perform proper maintenance.

There was also an important corporation exhibiting hybrid cars. Rick Case Honda brought a car to show students and faculty how to economize gasoline and to prevent air pollution.

Focus the Nation invited Captain Dan Kipnis who spoke about global warming and our changing oceans. Kipnis serves as a director for the Florida Wildlife Federation and has been appointed to the South Florida Climate Change Task Force. He is also among the first 1,000 disciples Al Gore plans to train to help spread his gospel of global climate.

As a practitioner of human resources in higher education, Dr. Edna Chun says she has been focusing her attention during the last few years on diversity and affirmative action. "In addition to being involved in human resources, I am very interested in equity and how it plays out in higher education. That is a very important principle for me," she

Apparently it was important enough to persuade Chun to write a book about it. As it turns out, the book she co-authored with Alvin Evans, Associate Vice-President for Human Resources at Kent State University received

an award from the premier U.S. association for human resources in higher education. Chun and Evans previously worked together at Kent State in 2000 - 2002.

On Nov. 29, 2007 Chun and Evans were honored by the College University Professional Association (CUPA) with the presentation of the prestigious Kathryn G. Hansen Publication Award during a conference in Baltimore, Maryland. They have previously published several articles in the CUPA Journal and have presented sessions on the topics of diversity and inclusion.

"Are the Walls Really Down? Behavioral and Organizational Barriers to Faculty and Staff Diversity in Higher Education" is the title of the award-winning book. Which, written from a practitioner's standpoint, offers new insights to the formal and informal barriers which inhibit the hiring, promotion and retention of women and minorities.

Chun said the equity portion of the book was especially important to her because she fits both those categories. "First, of course, I am a woman and secondly because of my Asian heritage I am part of a minority as well," she said.

"The higher up you go in an organization, the more isolated you become. In the United States, Asian-Americans comprise only 1.4 percent of people in administration."

Chun said they wanted to write this book because they were looking for answers. "We were looking for a way to change culture, a way to accomplish diversity. People

administrators) know they need to get there but they don't know how to do it," she said. Chun said they wanted to do something like a road map...getting people from where they are to where they need

Chun said the two of them developed a diversity score card in the book for institutions to determine what level they have achieved. "During a booksigning at the conference, people would open the book to the page containing the scorecard and say 'that's just what I needed, something to give me a jumpstart, something to work with... a tool I can use to measure performance'," she said.

According to Chun, from a functional perspective the book discusses the current best practices in the field of strategic-planning and assessment using examples drawn from public research universities. It also proposes a model for understanding the impact of subtle forms of discrimination, including emerging research on the physiological and psychological toll resulting from the effect of psycho-social stress on minorities and women.

"Understanding what needs to be attained is the antidote to all of this," she said. Chun said while doing their research for the book they found that most institutions of higher learning have a written plan of some kind, "but, when we called them up, as I did with everyone that is cited in the book, they would say 'I really don't know what came out of that plan. It looked good on paper, but it was not real'," Chun said. "When the people cannot tell you what the outcomes were, it means that they are not getting to actualize those plans."

"Empowerment is a twoway street and retention is a big factor," she said. According to

Chun, the book is available in many colleges and public libraries throughout the country. It is part of a series published by CUPA directed toward human resource professionals. "There is still a lot of work to be done in this area." she said, indicating the pair might write another book.

Chun said she is experiencing new found fame since receiving the award. "I am now being highly sought after and being invited to participate (in interviews)," she said. "I feel honored to be here at BCC and I want to share this award with the college. It is my way of saying 'thank you'," she said. "It is not all about me, it's about the environment at BCC that supports me and I am very grateful for that."



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

It seems as if the Video Game Arcade is a thing of the past. You can barely find any around Broward County, and practically everyone has a video game console at their house. So why would a daily gamer leave the house to go play elsewhere?

Game Breakers is a local online video game entertainment center across the street from BCC Central Campus, that allows students to take some time off from their schoolwork to experience a brand new style on an endless list of multi-player games, including top-sellers such as Halo 3, Call of Duty 4, Gears of War, Madden 2008 and the Guitar Hero collection.

These weekly events include a karaoke night every Wednesdays for the Guitar Hero/ Rock Band games; this unique place also has plans on opening up their own Bowling league for the Nintendo Wii.

"I found out about Game Breakers through one of my good friends, he told me about a Madden tournament coming up at the end of the month for the Xbox 360," said Malcolm Burney, a sophomore who is an avid Madden gamer.

Game Breakers also hold monthly tournaments and lockins for games such as Halo 3, Call of Duty 4, and Madden 2008. The Champion of each of these tournaments is rewarded with at least \$100 cash, or sometimes their own video game console.

"Some people just don't have enough money to buy a video game system, so this [Game Breakers] really helps," said Freshman George Richardson,

whose favorite games are Guitar Hero and Halo.

Olivier's goal is to provide a place in the community where people can hang out and stay away from trouble. Although Game Breakers has so much to offer, they do charge the local gamer an hourly fee. With this fee they normally include specials, which provide free beverages and wings with their admission. But some gamers don't wish to pay that fee because they would rather play at home.

"The best example I like to use is the gym. You might have a weight set at home, I'm sure it's fun, but you miss a social aspect that we provide. Its a lot if fun to play with all your boys right next to you and playing against some of the top gamers that come out here," said Olivier.

After one year of losing her husband, Kristine Carlson, now, has published that love letter as an inspirational book An Hour to Live, an Hour to Love.






"Anytime I get a free gym and no one is there I take around one thousand shots and work on my handles for the next level," mentioned Dennison.


